VOLUNTEER PROFILE: Executive Director(s)

Executive Director - The glue that keeps it all in place at ECHO. Like all positions at ECHO it is voluntary which is highly unusual at Community Based Organizations. We are saying goodbye and hello to two very talented leaders.



ANITA KING

A 21-year career in the US Air Force was not a requirement for success as the Executive Director of ECHO, but it no doubt gave Anita King a lot of leadership and problem-solving experience to fall back on as she took on that role in 2017. In addition to experience, Anita brought a can-do spirit, a positive outlook, and visionary thinking to the position. Sadly for ECHO, Anita has resigned her ECHO position to join her husband David who is now working in Stuttgart, Germany.

In 2006, Anita initially responded to a church bulletin's announcement that ECHO needed Spanish-speaking volunteers. She was an ECHO family counselor until a work assignment took the Kings to Germany in 2012. When Executive Director Meg Brantley learned that Anita was returning to our area in 2017, she recruited her (while she was still in Germany) to be Director of Client Services upon her return. After Meg retired months later, Anita stepped in as Executive Director.

When asked about her work at ECHO, Anita said that she saw herself as a "transition manager." Changing from her focus on client services to leadership of all aspects of a vibrant organization was a challenging transition, but the uncertainties of the Covid pandemic truly put her skills to the test. For a time, Anita and Family Counselor Charles McClelland dealt with many clients with a few volunteers in the Food Room and at the Donation Door to provide basic ECHO services. She was committed to keeping clients and volunteers safe from a (then) little-understood health threat. She also maintained a commitment to serve a community where need was burgeoning. more changes in a short time than ECHO had experienced over years of evolving. Anita had to innovate to keep the flow of vital assistance going. Some of those innovations have remained even as volunteers and clients returned to normal activities in the building.

Anita was proud that ECHO implemented new ideas such as Yard Sale coupons for clients and offering food choices for clients in the Food Room. She encouraged chairs to determine what clients really need rather than relying on tradition to dictate ECHO programs and practices. Even as she prepared to end her tenure, she was envisioning changes that ECHO could make in the years ahead to better serve elderly or physically challenged clients or to make ECHO's mission more widely understood in our service area.

Anita's energy and enthusiasm were vital in keeping ECHO growing in its mission during normal times and in keeping the flow of assistance steady during one of ECHO's toughest periods. It takes a special person to give their time and talent as a full-time volunteer. ECHO was privileged to have Anita in that challenging role. The best wishes and gratitude of hundreds of volunteers go with her as she leaves.



MIKE BAIER

Mike Baier, ECHO's incoming Executive Director, initially found ECHO through his military service. Mike's U.S. Army career began in 1969 and took him to numerous assignments in 9 states and 7 countries. He was living in Daventry in Springfield in the late 90's for his enrollment in The Senior Seminar, a State Department executive development program for those whose careers required them to represent the U.S. in foreign nations. In addition to its requirements, The Senior Seminar encouraged a year's commitment to a local volunteer organization. Mike chose ECHO and worked for a year in the cramped conditions of the original building before its 2005 expansion.

Returning to Fairfax County after his retirement from the Army, Mike was engaged in defense contracting work locally and in Afghanistan. He says he was following his wife Hyeson's example of community service when he started volunteering at ECHO again. He became involved with the Donation Door and the Food Room and served several days each week.

In the role of Executive Director, Mike brings a background of career achievements and vast experience with people of diverse languages, ethnicities, and cultures. He also brings a curiosity, saying "I learn something new every day at ECHO." And, perhaps best of all, he brings an expectation that neighbors help neighbors, a core value of our organization.

SAYING GOODBYE TO ANITA

It is with a heavy heart that we say farewell to Anita King as ECHO's Executive Director. Her tenure has guided ECHO through good times and difficult times and her contributions will remain long after she takes her leave. Thank you Anita for your time and talent.


Parking at ECHO

Clothing –1 volunteer Monday and Tuesday mornings and Tuesday evenings; 1 volunteer 1st & 3rd Friday mornings. Assist clients as they "shop" for clothing for their families.

Clothing support - 1 volunteer Monday mornings

Counselors – Assistant Counselor Monday mornings, Tuesday and Thursday evenings; counselor Monday through Friday mornings

E-Bay/online sales

Facilities Maintenance Lead – Using the team of facility maintenance volunteers, this Lead will coordinate needed maintenance and repairs in and around the building. When requested, this Lead will work to implement requests from various other area leads including researching and purchasing various supplies as needed.

Food Room – One volunteer Monday mornings to be part of a crew that goes to Wegmans at 8:00 AM to pick up donations from the loading dock. Can use personal vehicle or get qualified to drive the ECHO van and use the van. Duties: arrive at Wegmans at 8:00 AM to load donations into the vehicles, drive to ECHO and unload donations in the food room and help place in freezers or refrigerators. This is usually completed by 9:00 AM.

One volunteer Friday mornings—Inventory Management in addition to normal duties. MUST be able to lift 40 pounds above the head, be comfortable on a ladder while moving material.

Securities Lead – One volunteer is needed to ensure that ECHO's emergency and safety policy/procedures are implemented, and updated as needed. This position includes keeping track of who has been assigned the keys to ECHO's building, ensuring that "loaner" keys are returned, and that any updates to key holders are submitted to admin for updating the database.

Social Media Committee - Looking for volunteers with knowledge of social media platforms such as Facebook, Twitter and Instagram to post information about ECHO's work in the community. The goal would be to extend ECHO's current outreach to community members who follow social media platforms. This task can be done remotely and time on task would be flexible. This is a great opportunity for those who cannot commit to regularly scheduled volunteer hours. First Baptist Church Baby Formula Program

A program that started with retrieving baby formula samples that were going undelivered and unused to distribute them to families in need, has grown into a vital assistance program for our community. Since 2016, First Baptist Church of Springfield, partnering with the Neighborhood and Family Resource Centers, has participated in a program called the FBCS Baby Formula Ministry. The Resource Centers are sponsored by Fairfax County's Health and Human Services system. Because of the baby formula shortage, companies no longer send samples, so the program has had to evolve. More recently, ECHO has become a partner too, and now provides major financial support.

Rick Priest of First Baptist is the volunteer who works with the staff of the Family Resource Centers of Springfield and Culmore to get the formula to families who need it. The Resource Centers send him a list of the families and their formula needs. He works with Debby McElroy, ECHO Admin, who orders the formula and has it shipped to him. Rick packages the specific brand of formula required for each infant, (or its approved substitute during the ongoing shortage). He labels the packages and delivers them to the Family Resource Center at Springfield Gardens Apartments and the Family Resource Center of Culmore in Falls Church where they are distributed.

In some cases, a member of First Baptist will identify a family in need of formula and Rick delivers directly to that family or the church member. Rick delivers formula for about 50 - 55 families a month.

ECHO also sends formula that is donated to ECHO by the public to First Baptist since ECHO's Food Room no longer supplies clients with infant formula. ECHO ended its distribution of formula when Food Room volunteers found that they could not stock the range of different formulas that families needed.

ECHO's support has allowed Rick to deliver larger sizes which has then enabled him to go from weekly to monthly deliveries. The ongoing baby formula shortage has made the program more challenging. Sometimes Rick must provide approved substitute formulas since he and Debby can't predict how much of what types of formula will be available month to month.

The FBCS Baby Formula Ministry is an example of how government, faith communities, and non-profit service agencies can form alliances to help our neighbors live and thrive in our community.
