How We Educate Our Donors
Within ECHO we continually learn by doing. We also
have individual and collective responsibilities to
educate those we support (our clients), those who
support us (our congregations and the general public),
and, of course, ourselves about what we do and how
we do it.

Educating our donors about our needs is a responsibility we all share. As a common point of departure, we all should be familiar with what we can and cannot accept. For that, our website - What ECHO Can and Cannot Accept (www.echo-inc.org) – is the place to start. Realize that changes do occur between website updates. Due to space constraints in our building, we also have limits on some acceptable items like baby cribs. When in doubt about the most current information on acceptable items, please check with the Donation Door.

Also, for items we may bring in from a neighbor or another family member, the same rules apply. It's the responsibility of each of us to help adhere to those rules and as needed, to review what our neighbors may be donating and apply those rules.

Other guidance to keep in mind regarding donations:

 Client needs are the primary criteria for what we can accept, and storage space within ECHO is the primary criterion for how much we can accept.

 We have partnerships with activities like B-Thrifty, primarily to take what we can't store, not to take on what we should not have accepted in the first place.

 We also help other nonprofits like Medical Missionaries with specialty items (in this case medical supplies and equipment), and the MaRiH Center with items for single mothers.
 However, donors looking for ECHO to pass along items to activities such as Good Will or the Salvation Army should understand the need to donate their items themselves directly to those activities.

When items we do not accept make their way into the building by whatever means, some volunteer(s) will need to take the time to sort through and dispose of those items. Let's all help each other save time to better meet clients' needs. Thanks for all you do!

ECHO COVID POLICY UPDATE

Effective June 1, 2023, we will make masks optional for our clients coming into our building.

The following led to this change in our COVID prevention protocol:

- Since January 2023, the CDC and Fairfax County Health Departments assess Fairfax County as LOW for COVID
- In areas assessed as LOW, CDC advises, "People may choose to wear a mask at any time."
- In early April, a sampling of our sister Community Based Organizations' policies on masks for clients indicated: masks optional (at KOINONIA, WFCM); no masks (at LCAC, ACCA).
- During April we canvassed our volunteers who regularly engage clients (Counselors, Food, Clothing, Housewares) about any concerns with the change which was generally accepted.
- On May 12 the national COVID emergency ended.

While masks will be optional for clients, the following COVID prevention protocols remain in effect:

- As with all ECHO volunteers in the building, clients must provide proof of vaccination for entering the building.
- At any time, a volunteer may ask a client to put on a mask.



The long wait to begin parking lot construction on the vacant lot adjacent to ECHO's current volunteer and donation areas may end this summer. Final Fairfax County approval of the Parking Lot design is expected soon. Chamberlain Construction will manage the project and obtain bids from sub-contractors for major components of the work. Christopher Consultants (IMEG) will oversee the work and assure compliance with County requirements for storm-water management. As plans progress we will keep volunteers informed about parking alternatives, so please check for email notices to stay informed. Funding for this project has been building over time, in part thanks to all the volunteer efforts making our Yard Sale a bi-yearly success. We are excited to finally be in a position to make these plans a reality.

In Case of Fire...

The ECHO building is equipped with multiple smoke detectors that are monitored continuously by Security Central, our monitoring firm. If a detector goes off you will know it; the fire alarm is loud and unmistakable. In that event, Security Central will immediately call the Fairfax County fire dispatch. Once contacted, the fire department will come regardless of any subsequent calls, so even if you believe the alarm is a false alarm, there is no way to stop them. They will

inspect the building, and declare all clear if than is the case. Here are some Do's and Don'ts when the fire alarm goes off:

DO:

- Exit the building immediately via the nearest door. Counselors & others working with clients or non-ECHO volunteers should ensure they, and their children/dependents, exit the building safely and are accounted for.
- Proceed to the assembly point at the back of the un-paved parking area and attempt to account for all who were in the building when the alarm sounded. Make note of anyone who is missing and advise the fire department when they arrive.
- If you elect to leave ECHO, ensure someone who is staying knows you are out of the building before you depart, so you can be accounted for.

DO NOT:

- Stop to retrieve your purse, keys, coat or other belongings. If there is a fire, that could put you and others in danger. If there is no fire, we will be back in the building shortly.
- Go back in to the building after exiting. That could also put you and others in danger.
- Remain in the paved parking lot; fire department vehicles will fill that area shortly

Note that all of the smoke detectors are battery operated; there is also a battery backup in the alarm panel, which is in the utility closet next to the client entrance. If the system detects low voltage in any of these batteries, the alarm panel will beep periodically. If the alarm is for a detector, the panel will display the associated zone number. If you hear the alarm panel beeping, please make note of the zone number. You can then reset the system using the instructions posted next to the panel. Please notify one of the POCs (names and numbers are also posted on the instructions next to the panel) so we can replace the battery. You may need to reset the panel periodically until the battery is replaced.

Once again, ECHO clients were offered \$20 coupons to spend as they pleased on items at the Yard Sale and \$760 in coupons were redeemed. Sales on Friday (Volunteer Day) and Saturday (Open Sale) were \$11,825.75. Sales since the Fall at ECHO's in-house Yard Sale area were \$6,045. Thanks to Kathy Fruend and her in-house crew. Grand total: \$18,630.75 to go into ECHO's operating funds. Look for more details as the October date is scheduled for the Fall Yard Sale.

Volunteer Profile: Abiding Presence Lutheran Shares Its College Interns with ECHO

Abiding Presence Lutheran Church in Burke initiated an internship program in 2020 as Covid closures caused college-age members of the congregation to have their school-related summer internships cancelled. The Rev. Meredith Keseley, Senior Pastor, said that, after several of these young men and women contacted the church to see if there were opportunities for summer work experiences there, the idea of the internship program developed. Its success has caused the church to continue it even as Covid closures have ended.

Pastor Keseley and Pastor Kelsey Kresse, Associate Pastor, have designed the program to provide three months of faith formation, vocational discernment and leadership development for this age group. While the internship program constitutes a significant financial investment from the church's operating

budget, as well as donations from some members, it represents a commitment to follow the tenets of their faith and to engage young adults in the life of the church at a point in their lives where they are making big decisions.

Abiding Presence interns are paid a stipend and have a variety of work assignments including planning and leadership for youth day camps, assisting with the church's Food Pantry, even writing a manual on how to set up an internship program. Interns also engage in a daily morning prayer service before their work begins. They have presentations by speakers who talk about their own careers and how faith affects how they pursue their vocations.

This year, Abiding Presence is sharing two of its interns with ECHO. Ally Tingen, a rising junior who is studying Psychology and Neuroscience at Mary Washington College, is working with the counselors. Peyton Davis, a rising senior at James Madison University majoring in Marketing, is working with Joyce Giuliani on the Communications team. Ally and Peyton started their work with extensive tours of ECHO, and have assisted in or observed all of the various aspects of ECHO's operations.

In her work with individual counselors, Ally will spend her time this summer helping to assess client eligibility for assistance and determining which needs ECHO can meet. Her experience will include working in those ECHO areas which directly engage clients, the Food Room and the Clothing area. Peyton is writing articles (see one in this Newsletter). She will give the Communications team feedback on ECHO's website and prepare some Facebook posts. Both Ally and Peyton will work with Dave Buckley to update the library of local services. ECHO counselors use this library as a resource to find help for clients whose needs are beyond the scope of ECHO's assistance.

ECHO School Partnership Program

The clothing was donated to ECHO. Lastly, ECHO was invited to Saratoga ES's Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for their Stallion Family Stable. President Bob Vitter and Eileen Short attended this event. ECHO was identified by the school representative as an important partner to the school.

Food Room News

ECHO's Food Pantry usually has an abundance of breakfast cereal and soup, but there are so many food requests now that even those staples are currently in short supply. In addition, we welcome all kinds of donations, especially **cooking oil, bags of rice or beans, sugar, honey, spaghetti, toothpaste, dish detergent, deodorant, and toilet paper**.

The Letter Carrier food drive in May netted close to 6,000 pounds. This is the amount of food given out in 6 to 7 days. To keep our shelves full and give our clients an adequate enough amount of food, we will need the help of the entire community. Volunteer to help with the Holiday Meals program. For many years, this program has provided festive meals at Thanksgiving or Christmas for families experiencing financial hardship. Your time would mostly be needed in October, November and the first part of December. Most of the tasks include making phone calls and keeping a list on the computer. The process is already well organized by past volunteers.

Fix-it Desk - Tuesday and Thursday. The volunteer in this position tests non-clothing donations to ensure they're safe and operational. If something appears not to work properly, the volunteer attempts to determine the cause and fix it. If something needs to be repaired, the volunteer attempts to fix it. In addition, the volunteer performs a range of maintenance, supply and support operations to include:

- Ordering supplies (toilet paper, paper towel, facial tissues, cups, coffee, garbage/storage bags, and batteries on-hand).
- Coordinating with partner organizations for pick-up of items ECHO passes along to partners.
- Coordinating and perform HVAC maintenance (schedule semi-annual HVAC maintenance service; change furnace filters quarterly, etc.).
- Maintaining Fire Extinguishers (Schedule annual inspection; Perform a visual monthly inspection
