Notes from the Director's Desk

In the post-pandemic "new normal" of our current work/life environment, this note continues my effort to share among ourselves what we now do in the various sections to help meet our neighbors' needs. The goal of the tour of each of our sections is to nurture a collective appreciation for what each section does to meet our mission of helping our neighbors The tour will include each section's major responsibilities/tasks, major challenges, and, what other volunteers need to know about what that section does to help them in the work in their own sections. Last newsletter, we toured the Counselor section. This tour takes us to the **Food Room**.

Of the client needs ECHO helps meet, food is the most immediate. While food needs may fluctuate with the season and the extent of economic circumstances, we take in an average of 18,000 pounds of food a month, and give out 22,000 pounds a month. Meeting the food need for clients requires coordinated, complementary actions across the ECHO enterprise: Counselors to engage clients to determine eligibility for ECHO support and general areas of need and to set up food appointments; ECHO outreach to state our food needs (in newsletters, on our social media platforms); generous in-kind donor response from individuals and organizations; **Donation Door volunteers to process those** donations; Food Room volunteers to sort, store and stock the food, to coordinate with Counselors on food appointments, to help clients through the Food Choice options, to weigh and record the food provided during each client's visit to the Food Room, to purchase food items in short supply.

Notes from the Director's Desk . . . continued

To ensure ECHO's food program meets client needs, the Food Room volunteers:

- Manage and execute programs for food donations, purchase, sorting, and storage.
- Educate volunteers, donors, congregations, the general public about Food Room needs (for food items, volunteers, etc.).
- Guide the clients through the Food Choice program process, and record the results of each client's visit to the Food Room.
- Coordinate Food Room operations and programs with other ECHO teams –
 Counselors, Clothing, Housewares, etc. to help ensure ECHO operations and programs across the enterprise are complementary and mutually supporting in meeting client needs.
- Ensure Food Program operations, to include purchase of food from external commercial outlets, proceed in accordance with ECHO budgetary guidelines and standards.
- Coordinate ECHO Food Program operations, practices with those of partner organizations (e.g., County Government partners, other Community Based Organizations, etc.) to ensure complementary support and to reduce unnecessary duplication of support efforts in helping neighbors in need.

PARKING LOT PROGRESS

Update from Bob Vitter, President

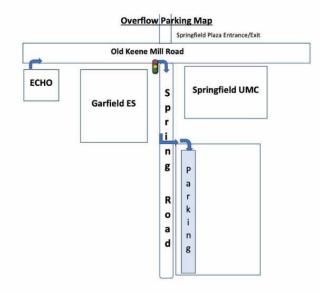
After many delays, construction on the new Volunteer Parking Lot is now in progress. Construction is expected to take 12 - 14 weeks, but remember construction weeks are similar to Dog Years.

During construction overflow parking will no longer be available and we will lose some spaces at the end of the paved parking area due to construction traffic.

Large construction vehicles will come through the Main (Client) entrance, drive around the back of the building and enter the construction area via the former gravel entrance to overflow parking.

- Do not park along the back fence (near the sheds) or in the parking spaces close to the back fence - we will mark the spaces that are not to be used
- We will reserve some parking spaces next to the building for Volunteers with limited mobility
- Other parking spaces in the Volunteer Lot will be on a first come basis
- We have made arrangements with Springfield United Methodist Church to use some parking in their lot on Spring Road - see attached map
- If you park there, please park ONLY in the designated area and put an ECHO Volunteer sign on your dash.
- We will setup an area near the Volunteer Entrance with updates on construction status and extra copies of the SUMC map and the Volunteer sign
- I encourage Volunteers working on a specific day to form carpools - either from home or meet at SUMC and park then one Volunteer drives to ECHO
- If you currently work 9:30 12:30 but can work in the afternoon - please consider shifting your scheduled time for the duration of the construction
- Evening and Saturday shifts should not be impacted since we have fewer Volunteers working those shifts





Please Park ONLY in the parking spaces on the right side, next to Spring Road.

DO NOT park in the middle section.

Put an ECHO Volunteer sign on your dash.

ECHO's COVID POLICY UPDATE

December 13, 2023

As of 1 December 2023, according to the CDC, the Fairfax County hospital admissions rate for COVID cases is **LOW** (https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/index.html)

Current precautions include:

- Stay up to date with Covid-19 vaccines
- · Maintain ventilation improvements
- · Avoid contact with people who have suspected or confirmed cases of COVID-19
- Follow recommendations for isolation if you have suspected or confirmed COVID-19
- Follow the recommendations for what you are to do if you are exposed to someone with COVID-19
- If you are at high risk of getting very sick, talk with a health care provider about additional prevention actions

Based on this guidance, ECHO's current COVID Policy is as follows:

- Masks are a personal choice. Those Volunteers that are working/interfacing with clients (their choice) may ask the client to wear a mask and the volunteer would obviously wear a mask while working with them. Volunteers and clients may use masks at anytime, anywhere while in ECHO.
- Vaccination recommended for all Volunteers. Staying "up-to-date" on COVID vaccinations
 now means a regular, probably annual, injection developed to handle the latest COVID
 variant. Documenting that frequency to "prove" current "up-to-date" vaccination status is
 impractical/impossible to implement in ECHO's all-volunteer environment. Rather, ECHO
 continues to encourage all Volunteers to follow CDC guidance for staying up-to-date on
 vaccinations. Encouraging/ recommending vaccinations is also part of the recruiting
 interview process for new Volunteers.
- ECHO encourages/recommends that all clients follow CDC guidance for staying "up-to-date" on COVID vaccinations. Counselors will encourage/recommend to all clients that they follow CDC guidance for staying "up-to-date" on COVID vaccinations. Counselors will provide that guidance as a part of the in-take process, along with information on COVID vaccination availability. ECHO will continue to provide clients COVID at-home test kits (as available). As with Volunteers, Counselors will also advise clients that they may use masks at any time while inside the ECHO building.
- · COVID Positive Notification.
 - o If a Volunteer tests positive for COVID, notify your Shift Lead, Committee Chair.
 - The Volunteer will follow CDC guidance for isolation (currently for five days) and wear a
 mask for 10 days after testing positive. If asymptomatic, they can then return to ECHO.
 (Positive Volunteers please follow the CDC website for Care What to Do if You Are Sick).
 - The Shift Lead/Committee Chair will handle notification within the shift, to those who may have had long contact with other volunteers to the Director.

VOLUNTEER PROFILE: ECHO'S ENRICHMENT BAG TEAM

The Enrichment Bag team might boast that their program is the most fun of any of ECHO's year-round volunteer efforts. They assemble age-appropriate packages of toys, games, and books to give to the children of clients. Co-chairs Susie Miller and Andi Smith lead a group that is determined to bring both fun and learning to children whose families are experiencing financial hardship.

Susie, a founder of the program, describes its beginning this way: "Around 14 years ago, while volunteering in Housewares, I was putting some items in the "freebie" section out front, when a client approached me and asked me to find a book for her 6th grade daughter. We talked and I helped her select several books on different reading levels. Later, another volunteer, Debbie Eakin, and I were discussing the abundance of toys ECHO receives. An idea to make age-appropriate packages for the children of clients kept rumbling around in our heads and we approached Barbara McDonald, Housewares Cochair, (who) told us to talk to Meg Brantley, the Director. Both were very receptive, and the enrichment program began with the two of us."

Each Enrichment Bag contains something educational, something soft such as a stuffed animal, and something fun such as Play-Doh or a puzzle. The bags are given out at clothing appointments to all clients who have children under 15. Each week, 30 to 50 Enrichment Bags are distributed to ECHO client households. In addition to enjoying their work together, this team has a common goal. Pat O'Hara says she likes "the comradery of being with other like -minded volunteers who want to put a smile on the face of a child."

Co-Chair Andi calls the group of volunteers on this project the "Toy Tuesday Team." The team includes Lynn Colahan, Carole Flamm, Laura Holsinger, Pat O'Hara, and Andrea Talbott. Sometimes Andi's seven-year-old grandson gets drafted to check out puzzles and games at her home to certify that they are complete and ready to bring happiness to a child.

The work includes sorting through donations for items appropriate for the program. The Enrichment bags are made up and labelled by age and gender. The team makes sure the items included are clean and in working order. Lynn Colahan says, "It's important that what we give to them is complete-puzzle pieces and game pieces." These women use this project to convey love and respect to the children who receive these packages.



Carole says, "I really enjoy making special packages...that can help bring joy and learning opportunities to the children we support. I am also grateful for the comradery and sense of community I feel with the volunteer team at ECHO."

While this project has a line item in ECHO's budget so that they may purchase some items to complete the Enrichment Bags if needed, the team finds most of the materials for the program in the donations that come through ECHO's Donation Door. Laura says, "I love making use of all the great stuff (books, toys, games, toiletries, etc.) ... by giving it to the families who may not otherwise be able to afford them." In addition, the Toy Tuesday Team takes donated books that ECHO can't use to McKay's in Manassas where they are able to trade for books appropriate for this project.



Andrea sums up the enjoyment of being a member of the Toy Tuesday Team in these words, "Volunteering at ECHO is a great way to give back ... It gives me the opportunity to plan and organize (which I love), while being a part of a very dynamic team. Each Tuesday I partner with a team of amazing women, whose work will have a positive impact on many families within the community."

All 200 Christmas Meal recipients were from the remainder of ECHO-covered zip codes. The number of client responses to our invitation showed that the need for food is still strong. Many of the clients thanked ECHO for the invitation to receive a meal.



FALL YARDSALE UPDATE

The October 28th Yard Sale in St Bernadette's Catholic Church school gym went well and the assistance from St. Berndette's was a huge help. The church rented tables and set them up early Friday morning. Total sales for the Fall Yard Sale were \$18,020.20 with \$11,116.20 received on Friday and Saturday. Inhouse sales, April 18 - October 26th were \$5,824. We were once again able to offer clients \$20 coupons of which \$1,080 were redeemed.

This is always an exciting event and the teamwork involved in the effort shows the spirit of ECHO in giving and receiving. ECHO RED CROSS FIRST AID TRAINING



To improve our ability to respond to emergencies in the ECHO building, we arranged for Red Cross first aid training. Twenty-five ECHO volunteers were certified in Red Cross first aid/CPR/AED during two training sessions on October 18 and November 15. ECHO now has Red Cross-certified volunteers for every shift except Wednesday evening. We will put that Red Cross training on a two-year cycle to match that for Red Cross certification. The Red Cross trainers also recommended on-line training in opioid overdose and naloxone, details for which we passed to the volunteers who received this training.

The Rolling Valley Ward of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints

The Rolling Valley Ward of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, one of ECHO's supporting congregations, has its own podcast called Rolling Valley Stories. The podcast is produced by members of the congregation. The use of this technology within a local faith community offers a fresh approach to reaching out to members. Brad Cochran, the member of the Ward who produces the podcast, and David Stankiewicz, the Ward's representative to the ECHO Board of Directors, credited bishop Jake Aplanalp of their congregation with the idea for the podcast. Bishop Aplanalp believed it would be useful in building meaningful connections between members. He wanted to use the podcast as a vehicle for members to strengthen each other spiritually.

Brad, as interviewer and technical producer of the program, captures the living histories of members who voluntarily sign up to be interviewed. Brad says that the best part of the podcast endeavor is "hearing about the struggles, challenges, failures and successes of others and how those experiences have affected their life and drawn them closer to God and Jesus Christ." Sometimes the stories include times of great stress or sadness. Listeners may hear their own challenges reflected in the stories and draw inspiration from the accounts of the role of faith in the lives of those who are interviewed. Though the initial idea was to use the podcasts as a way of fostering unity within the congregation, they are distributed on popular podcast sites such as Google, Apple, and Spotify, so that anyone who is interested may download and listen to them.

The Rolling Valley Ward has a long relationship with ECHO. David says that the Ward tries to include as many different members as possible in helping ECHO serve people in need in the community. They hold regular food drives to help keep ECHO's Food Pantry stocked; their youth clean ECHO's building once a week; and they rotate with other Church of Jesus Christ congregations to provide lawn-mowing and other clean-up for the outside of the building.

The congregation offers further opportunities for its members to support people in our community. In addition to their efforts on behalf of ECHO, David says, "Along with other congregations of the Church of Jesus Christ, we support the Resource Center for a Better Life, which provides free classes in English, basic computer skills, American culture and sewing instruction to recent immigrants and refugees."
